- Maintain unrestricted contact between the architects of all countries irrespective of national and political frontiers
- Represent the profession at an international level
- Maintain public confidence in the integrity and the ability of architects
- Develop progressive ideas in the fields of architecture and related fields, as well as their practical application for the welfare of the community
- Define and re-define, whenever necessary, the role of the architect in a changing world
- Encourage the association of architects with other disciplines and stress the value of architects' work
- Encourage all actions aimed at raising awareness of space and three-dimensional form at all stages of general education



OBJECTIVES

- Highlight the role and identity of the architect in the contexts of quality, sustainability, and cultural and community values, emphasising the holistic nature of architecture and urban design
- Give all possible support to architectural organisations in all countries
- Work towards the establishment of internationally accepted and recognised standards of competence to practice and mutual recognition of qualifications
- Promote and encourage the development of architectural education in all its aspects and facilitate international exchange and cooperation
- Contribute to preservation of peace among nations as the basis for realising the needs and ambitions of people throughout the world
- Advocate for human dignity and the eradication of all forms of violence, discrimination, and inequity
- Promote environmental and climate conditions that allow life in a balanced ecosystem and the well- being of humanity



MEMBERSHIP @


Membership is divided into five regions:

- Region I (Western Europe): 14 Member Sections, 19 countries, 253,574 architects
- Region II (Central and Eastern Europe and the Middle East): 24 Member Sections, 27 countries, 112,905 architects
- Region III (The Americas): 20 Member Sections, 164,783 architects
- Region IV (Asia and Oceania): 24 Member Sections, 130,708 architects
- Region V (Africa): 35 Member Sections, 83,695 architects



MEMBERSHIP

The UIA has 117 Member Sections and represents approximately 745,665 architects in 125 countries





UIA GOLD MEDAL AND PRIZES

Awarded on a triennial basis to recognise achievements of international impact

Since 1984: **UIA Gold Medal** for outstanding architectural achievement; the most prestigious distinction attributed to an architect by architects

Since 1961: Patrick Abercrombie Prize for Urban Planning and Design

Since 1961: Auguste Perret Prize for Technology in Architecture

Since 1967: Jean Tschumi Prize for Architectural Writing

Since 1978: Sir Robert Matthew Prize for Sustainable and Human Environment

WORLD CAPITAL OF ARCHITECTURE

In 2017, the UIA adopted a resolution to formally request that UNESCO be associated with its initiative to designate the next UIA World Congress host city as the World Capital of Architecture.

UNESCO and UIA agreed to prepare a 10-year plan of action covering the period 2017-2027, and including the designation of the 2020, 2023 and 2026 World Capitals of Architecture.

UNESCO's participation in the nomination of the UIA World Congress host cities as World Capitals of Architecture, represents the natural continuation of this long-standing partnership.





FORUMS

The **UIA** holds interim **Forums** approximately mid-way between the triennial **UIA World Congresses**, focusing on a specific theme that is of significant relevance to the architectural profession.

WORLD ARCHITECTURE DAY




Created by the **UIA** in 1985
